ELECTIONS AND ANNUAL MEETING

The Township Annual Election and Meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 9th, at the Bridgewater Town Hall at 500 Railway Street, Dundas. The Polls will be open from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm. On the ballot will be four of the five Supervisor positions and the position of Treasurer. Unless postponed by the Board of Supervisors, the Annual Township Meeting will begin at 8:15 pm in the Town Hall following the election.

Below are the candidates for the positions of Supervisor.

GLEN CASTORE (Position "A" – 3-year term)

My wife, Barbara Zaveruha, and I moved to Bridgewater in 2004. Shortly after that I became involved in discussions about locating an ethanol plant in the Township. That led to my becoming a supervisor from 2006 through 2012. I spent the next several years helping to organize the Northfield Area Fire and Rescue Service. In 2018 I was again elected to the Board. ROGER HELGESON (Position "E" – 2-year term)

Hi, my name is Roger Helgeson, I'm employed by Northfield Schools, I've been a resident of Bridgewater township living on Decker Ave for 51 years. During that time a lot has changed in the township. While some changes are inevitable, I think we need to carefully control the sprawl of Dundas and Northfield into our township as much as we can. We need to negotiate a viable agreement with them that allows sensible growth and also preserves our farmland as much as possible. Farming is our heritage here, and we need to advocate for and look after the stewards of the land as much as possible.

Snow Removal

We would like to remind Bridgewater Township residents that it is unlawful to deposit snow onto public roadways or to push snow across public roadways per Minnesota Statute 160.2715. Snow deposited or pushed onto the road can create hazards to the public and snow removal operations. Citizens that violate this statute could face misdemeanor and/or civil penalties if the snow creates a hazard that contributes to an accident. The Township snow removal/sanding trucks will be out as soon as possible following a 2" snow event.

Bridgewater Township Road Right-of-Way

Along all Bridgewater Township roads is a strip of land legally established for public road purposes. This road right-of-way is much wider than the top of the road and includes ditches and cleared space to allow for safety and visibility. This space on both sides of the road separates the resident's property from the road and provides space for utilities, drainage, road construction and maintenance.

Bridgewater Township's road right-of-way exists to facilitate safe transportation. On most roads, this right-of-way extends 33 feet from the center line on both sides of the road. By having a clear right-of-way, the driving public is protected from striking close stationary objects when they leave the roadway. According to state statute, the right of way may be used by motorists, bicyclists, ATV's, snowmobiles, and pedestrians. Placement of barricades that prevent safe passage is not permitted.

In Bridgewater Township, the following are permitted in the road right-of-way:

- Your legal mailbox setting
- Permitted drainage culverts and driveways
- Permitted utilities (public or private)
- Signage to keep the highway safe

The following are not permitted:

- Over-designed mailbox settings such as stone pillars
- Constructing or reconstructing an access without a permit
- Plowing snow across the roadway
- Constructing landscape retaining walls
- Placing fences, boulders, posts, trees and shrubbery within the right of way
- Unpermitted signs

The Township has the right and obligation to remove any items that may constitute a potential safety hazard. Safety hazards includes trees and brush. The Township will be taking steps in mitigate these hazards. Overhanging large branches and dead trees have been responsible for damage to trucks, vehicles, and in some instances, have prevented emergency vehicles from providing timely assistance. When possible, the Township will notify residents of plantings that need to be moved.
